THE WELL: A GATHERING OF MULTI-RACIAL UU FAMILIES

Building on DRUUMM Multiracial and Families of Color retreats that started in the Pacific Northwest and Pacific Southwest Districts, a new program is being envisioned for July 20-27 at Ferry Beach retreat center in Saco Maine.

Save the date for the first of what we hope will be an annual gathering of multiracial UU families on the shores of the Atlantic Ocean. The Well is a faith formation retreat, intended to provide a rare multi-generational space for children, youth, and adults to explore our spiritual paths, the rites of passage that bear witness to our experiences, music, arts, and food that speak to our souls, and worship that inspires us all. Details about housing, transportation, meals, scholarships, and programming are forthcoming.

THE SANKOFA SPECIAL COLLECTION

The Rev. Dr. Michelle Bentley served as minister of Third Unitarian Church in Chicago and hosted one of the earliest DRUUMM Youth and Young Adults of Color retreats in the late 1990s. She was supportive of the growing movement of young people of color organizing in the UUA and had reached out to organizers to invite folks to gather at her congregation. A number of young adults of color were at Meadville-Lombard Seminary nearby, or had recently graduated providing additional support.

Young people gathered from across North America, building on the first gathering in Atlanta GA the year before, and ultimately building momentum to meet the following year in St Petersburg FL. Dreams were shared and a new relationship between DRUUMM and the UUA emerged leading to culturally specific ministries within the Youth Office and Office of Young Adult and Campus Ministries.

Rev. Bentley went on to serve in the UUA Ministry Department and on the faculty of Meadville-Lombard, mentoring many along the way. Working with a dedicated team of staff and volunteers, she secured a long-term commitment from the seminary to create and host the Sankofa Special Collection in the mid-2000s.

These stories and more are archived along with biographies, worship resources and images that tell the stories of Unitarian Universalists of Color. "The purpose of the Sankofa Special Collection is reflected in its name. Sankofa means looking to the past in order to move forward into the future. Sankofa looks into the silences and absences created by white supremacy, to amplify what has been muted and to recover what has been obscured."

Sankofa is a living collection and we are constantly on the lookout for new acquisitions that document the rich history of Unitarian Universalists of Color. There is a rich physical collection available for viewing on-campus in Chicago IL and there is a growing digital archive with over 8,000 images. INVOCATION WITH THE VERMONT STATE SENATE

Rev. Joan Javier-Duval, Minister of the Unitarian Church of Montpelier VT, gave the invocation for the beginning of the 2019 legislative session last week. Here are her words, shared with permission.

find their way to the center of your discourse again and again.

May you know that "goodness is the only investment that never fails."*

And so, may you choose to invest your time, resources, and goodwill into all that nurtures compassion, justice, equity, and peace.

May all that you do bring healing rather than harm to people and our precious planet.

May you travel this road of service together as colleagues

with an eye to the future and a respect for our past,

with mutual respect,

with open minds and hearts,

with listening ears, and

with the humility that admits we are wrong as much as we are right.

And, may Love, the ever-present, universal, insistent and persistent moving spirit of compassion and care,

always be both known within these walls and also shown beyond them.
